


Considerations for Redistricting of the Maryland Senate

Relevant Differences From Congressional Plan

- 1. Greater population variance (+/- 5%) allowed Ideal (adjusted) district population = 131,392 [Allowable range = 124,822 to 137,961]
- 2. Stricter political subdivision requirement based on caselaw and state constitution.
- 3. Caselaw on not crossing the Chesapeake Bay.
- 4. Nesting requirement for House districts affects Senate districts.
- 5. Voting Rights Act considerations play a bigger role.

Considerations

- □ Permissible/Target Deviation?
- Montgomery County can support exactly 8 districts
- □ Four Western Maryland counties can together support exactly four districts
- □ How many districts should traverse the borders of Prince George's, Baltimore County and Baltimore City?
- ☐ In particular, should a district span Baltimore City and Anne Arundel or Baltimore County? Should a Prince George's District go into Anne Arundel or Montgomery?

Conceptual challenges

- 1. Which race data to use adjusted or unadjusted?
- 2. How to count multiracial individuals?
- 3. How to account for citizens and noncitizens?
- 4. How to consider minority coalition districts?
- 5. How to deal with areas where additional majority Black VAP districts come at the expense of majority Hispanic VAP districts?
- 6. When should political subdivisions be split in order to deal with VRA concerns (while avoiding *Shaw v. Reno* concerns)?

Specific Areas of Concern

- 1. Unpacking Prince George's County and Baltimore
- 2. Identifying areas where additional opportunity districts for House exist in current plan or could be drawn:
 - Wicomico and Dorchester Counties
 - Frederick? Harford? (Coalition Districts?)
- 3. How to deal with border between Prince George's and Montgomery Counties?
- 4. Should a majority Hispanic VAP* district be drawn in Prince George's and/or Montgomery County?

Maryland Constitution

Article 3, Section 4:

"Each legislative district shall consist of **adjoining** territory, be **compact** in form, and of **substantially equal** population. <u>Due regard</u> shall be given to **natural boundaries and the boundaries of political subdivisions**."

Governor's Order (Part 1)

- 1. The Commission shall prepare one plan for Maryland's state legislative districts and one plan for Maryland's congressional districts, in conformance with the following:
 - a. The plans shall:
 - i. Comply with all State and federal constitutional and legal requirements, including the Voting Rights Act;
 - ii. Comply with all applicable judicial direction, rulings, judgments, or orders;
 - iii. Respect natural boundaries and the geographic integrity and continuity of any municipal corporation, county, or other political subdivision to the extent practicable; and
 - iv. Be geographically compact and include nearby areas of population to the extent practicable;

Governor's Order Part 2

- c. Congressional districts shall:
 - i. Equal the number of representatives in the U.S. Congress that have been apportioned to the state; and
 - ii. Be equal in population to the extent practicable; and
- d. Legislative districts shall be:
 - i. As nearly equal in population as is feasible given due regard for natural boundaries and the boundaries of political subdivisions;
 - To the extent possible and consistent with the Commission's other duties and responsibilities, subdivided into single-member delegate districts; and
 - iii. Numbered consecutively commencing at the northwestern boundary of the state and ending at the southeastern boundary of the state.
